1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

An acclaimed social leader Late Jitendra Nath Maitra was the pioneer, and he was later joined by many distinguished personalities of the locality. Notable among them were Prof. P. N. Mukherjee, Prof. S. N. Banerjee, Dr. P. N. Bandyopadhyay, Prof. S. P. Mukherjee, Dr. Haramohan Sinha and renowned Bengali poets like Kalidas Roy and Kumud Ranjan Mallick who threw their weight behind the establishment of a college at Katwa. Their sincere and indefatigable efforts took on a tangible form with the inauguration of the college on 16th August 1948. The College was initially affiliated to Calcutta University until Burdwan University was established on 16th June 1960. Its inclusion into 2(f) and 12(B) categories under UGC Act, 1956 took place in 01.03.1959 and 01.03.1966 respectively and it now enjoys grant in aid financial status under the Govt. of India. The college also enjoys grant in aid financial status under the Govt. of West Bengal. Besides the achievements of the statutory status, the college has been untiringly and sincerely carrying on its mission.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

1. Institutional freeships along with the option for payment in instal have been ensured to make education more accessible to underprivileged groups. In addition to that more than 70% students get government, Kanyashree(only for girls) and non-government scholarships. The college also provides the facilities to the students for getting admission in sports quota along with monetary assistance for participating such sports events.
2. Strong emphasis on community and social programmes organised along with traditional class room teaching through NCC, NSS Units, Kisan Mitra Cell, MoU with Society for Mental Health Care: Anada Niketan, Nature Club, Electoral Literacy Club and Go-Green.
3. Departmental teacher-guardian committee, centrally constituted guardian committee and the alumni association allows friendly relationship among different stakeholders.
4. The college being situated in a historical area has a heterogeneous population of all castes and creeds and as a result of it students and staff participate in large number in various cultural activities throughout the year.
5. Wide circulation of information has been enabled for teaching, learning and administration, through the website, Facebook page and the college notice board.
6. Supply of clean and purified drinking water facility been provided.
7. We have our Own dedicated Electrical Transformer. College uses LED bulbs and Sensor system in the classrooms, offices and canteen to save electricity.
8. High speed internet facility with a good number of ICT enabled rooms and record room. E-learning facilities beyond the classroom teaching.
9. Barrier free environment for physically challenged people using wheel chairs.
10. Feedback from all stakeholders taken and analyzed for improvement at regular intervals.
11. The college has a registered Alumni Association. This association organizes various career counselling programmes, participates in sports meets and provides speakers in NSS programmes and judges in sports programmes. The association also provides financial support for the development of the college.
12. The college has a separate unit for publication of an online Multidisciplinary International journal.
13. Ragging free campus. Initiative taken by the students and staff for complying with the ragging free guidelines.
14. Environmental awareness and protection activities are arranged by the Nature Club and NSS unit through plantation of saplings and trees, mangrove plantation in Sundarban with Purbasha Eco Helpline Society, regular waste management in collaboration with Katwa Municipality. The West Bengal Pollution Control Board installed Air Quality and Noise Monitoring Sensor in the college premise.
15. Auditorium, Gym, Cycle stand, Playground, Indoor Game facilities are available.

16. Organizing health awareness activities, blood donation camps by Arogya- a health centre of Katwa College, Physiology department, NCC and NSS. Measures are taken with the help of Katwa Municipality for prevention of dengue, malaria etc.

Institutional Weakness

Teacher: student in the Academic Year is 1:70 in our multi-shift college. Teaching posts are not created as per requirement of CBCS, NEP2020 and NAAC guidelines.

2. The college is observing increasing dropout rate after the advent of Covid-19.
3. Lack of parental awareness.
4. Due to geographical disadvantages as well as agricultural based area, connection with industry and corporate houses and start ups are yet to happen.
5. Unavailability of Post-Graduate courses.
6. Non-recruitment of NTS in vacant posts due to non-approval of the Government.
7. Limited autonomy in formulating curriculum design.
8. Lack of adequate finance challenges the development of education and infrastructure.

Institutional Opportunity

1. Possibility of introducing more varieties of Add-on programmes beyond curriculum and Skill-oriented /Job Oriented Counselling programmes.
2. Providing special indoor and outdoor sports training for students interested in pursuing the relevant career.
3. Possibility of generation and utilization of more solar energy in the campus through financial support from the authority.
4. Faculty members have the potentiality to achieve more research projects and publications.
5. Strengthening of remedial and tutorial classes, conduct periodical class tests for providing additional support to the slow learners for better progression at UG level.
6. More Extension and Social Outreach programmes as a part of institutional social Responsibility.
7. New Education Policy opened up an opportunity for the college to execute inter-disciplinary/multidisciplinary based research and academic activities for the students and teachers.

8. Commence more PG programs and UG courses.
9. Encouraging students to participate in online programs such as MOOCs, SWAYAM and NPTEL.
10. Seminars and capacity building workshops
11. MOU with Industrial organizations.

Institutional Challenge

1. Providing special indoor and outdoor sports activity for students interested in pursuing sports as a career.
2. To introduce a couple of foreign language Add-on courses.
3. The college has appealed for the introduction of two PG courses and ten UG programmes as per the demand of the Students Union and IQAC for approval of the West Bengal Council Of Higher Education Department ,Government Of West Bengal and anxious with the delay awaiting for its response for prompt action.
4. To reduce the number of dropout students.
5. To increase the student strength in streams like Science, Commerce & Economics.
6. Poor socio-economic backgrounds of the students as most of the students are first generation learners. As a result of this, we are facing challenges to motivate them for completion of the course/study.
7. The chances of students' employment and absorption after the successful completion of Graduation have reduced drastically in the country both in Public & private Sectors. To overcome this situation more job oriented programmes needs to be introduced and regular recruitment programmes be organized for offering more placement opportunities.
8. To keep pace with the rapidly changing world and to establish collaborations with industries for better career opportunities.
9. In previous NAAC visit, the Hon'ble Peer team had recommended to establish one computer lab with 50 computers. The Governing Body of Katwa College has already sanctioned sufficient money for setting up of computer laboratory and remodelling the Central Library with vide Item No.14(c) dated 16.09.2023. But according to the Financial Regulations set by the Government of West Bengal for the procurement of money above Rs one lakh, e-tender process to be strictly followed. We are also aware that to avail the GEM portal we need the Government email id from NIC and we have already applied for it to the Hon'ble DPI, Government of West Bengal but unfortunately we have not received it yet from the DPI . We are also trying to overcome the situation with the help of HDFC Bank and the Branch Manager along with his staff are trying hard to comply but not been possible till date.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Being an affiliated college under the University of Burdwan, the institution has little flexibility in making decisions on curriculum planning and designing, though through indirect measures such as the mechanism of Board of Studies (4 teachers as members of BOS, 2024), gets certain amount of responsibility. The College offers 16 UG courses B. A, B.Sc. and B. Com in Honours, General following the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) & 16 UG courses of BA, B.Sc. and B.com in 3-Year Major/4-Year Major under NEP,2020 and a B. Ed

curriculum. Curriculum delivery In aspects of curriculum delivery, it caters to this mammoth task through well-maintained and documented processes are as follows:

- ? Guidance & orientation at the beginning of the curriculum.
- ? Academic calendar provided for teaching, learning & conducting the internal examinations of each semester.
- ? Semester wise class routine for tutorials, remedial and special classes.
- ? Module syllabus.
- ? Credit-based classes for laboratory/practical classes.
- ? High-speed internet connections for demonstrations in ICT based lectures.
- ? Study material/lectures/e-learning materials to allow students provided.
- ? Resource persons invited from institutions with MOU.
- ? Mentors allotted for all Hons/Major students.
- ? Seminar lectures on multidisciplinary topics.
- ? Guardian meeting at the end of each semester to collect feedbacks
- ? Project work and excursions organized.
- ? Provides ample scope for learning through seminars, conferences, workshops, special lectures.
- ? Orientation Programmes for freshers.

Continuous Internal Evaluation:

? Regular Internal Evaluation

? Offered 50 Add-on Courses (2019 to 2024) to allow students develop soft skills, language skills, life skills, ICT skills.

Add-on Courses Katwa College has offered 50 Add-on Courses in the last 5 years starting from the academic session 2019 to 2024. Crosscutting Issues

? Integrates issues of Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values and Environmental Sustainability.

? Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, are integrated within their learning experience through various extra-curricular activities like the NSS.

? Cleanliness and plantation drives, World Environment Day observation.

Feedback The institute regularly solicits feedback from all its stakeholders, such as students, faculty members, alumni, parents, and employers, on curriculum, infrastructure, teachers, employability, and overall campus experience through structured questionnaire, and upon analysis takes necessary action.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching-learning & evaluation with students' centric approach are the top most priority sector of the college. The whole process is planned & monitored by IQAC& implemented affectedly by all the departments.

- The college follows a well-administered and transparent procedure of admission. Student admissions are held as per the reservation policy of the Government of India, guidelines of the University of Burdwan and the directives issued by the Government of West Bengal. In overall enrollment percentage and enrolment under the reserved categories are 64.17 and 64.10 respectively over the last five years.
- Teacher Student Ratio of the college is not satisfactory (1:73) due to insufficiency of sanctioned post as well as for few vacant posts (recruited teacher-93.88%).
- For enhancing learning experience of the students, various methods like experimental learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are adopted by the faculties in various ways like conducting practical classes, projects, field trips, seminars, workshops, hands-on trainings, add-on courses, outreach programme, competitions and other co-curricular activities.
- ICT infrastructure of the college (KOHA, OPAC, Infilbnet subscription, LCD Projectors, High-speed internet and computers) provide quality education to students.
- Teachers use projectors, online platform (Google meet, Google classroom) for effective execution and content delivery in teaching, learning and evaluation.
- Teachers are well qualified with Ph.D., NET, SET as the highest qualification (62.91%).
- Students are assessed on a continuous basis through internal assessment monitored by the Examination Committee of the college and external examination conducted by the university.
- Examination Committees is entrusted to ensure redressal of any internal exam related grievances of the students. Any grievance related to university level examination, is communicated by the college to the University authority.
- The POs, COs are shared with the students though college website, class room interaction. Outcome based learning is enhanced with mapping of attainment of COs and Pos through result analysis, feedback, higher education progress and placement record.
- Pass percentage of the students is above 78% in the last 5 years. Many students from several departments hold rank in the university examination.
- Student Satisfaction Surveys are conducted annually amongst the enrolled students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Katwa College has been striving through various initiatives to create an innovative ecosystem promoting research, creation and transfer of knowledge.

- It publishes an international peer-reviewed e-Journal for research publications and also departmental wall magazines and e-magazines. The student union also publishes a magazine for students to develop their writing skills.

- The institution through IQAC and also the various departments organizes seminars, workshops, conferences as well as Faculty Development Programmes on various topics including on research methodology, Intellectual Property Rights and entrepreneurship. The college has IPR Cell which organizes various programmes on IPR.
- The college has conducted add-on courses for students on various topics including communicative English, Yoga, employment-oriented and skill-development courses. Indian Knowledge System is taught as part of syllabus in various subjects like English, Bangla, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Philosophy.
- The college has a Nature Club, Literacy Society and an Arogya Health Centre. It also has a Kishan Mitra Cell which undertakes free soil testing and provides agricultural inputs for the benefit of nearby farmers.
- The college has active NSS units which regularly organize awareness, outreach and other social service programmes. There is also a NCC unit for boys which organizes programmes on Independence Day, Republic Day and other occasions. There is a Career Counselling Cell which organizes programmes on job opportunities in various fields as well as entrepreneurship skills.
- The college has an incubator in the Botany Department.
- The college has a Research Cell through which faculty members are encouraged to undertake research, present papers and publish research articles. Faculty members are also provided NOCs for pursuing PhD. The Library provides e-resources through Inflibnet. The college regularly conducts extension and outreach activities for sensitizing students and the neighbourhood community on various social issues for their holistic development like Har Ghar Tiranga, environment, sanitation, etc.
- The institution and also individual students have won awards in various fields of sports, cultural and educational as well as participation in governmental schemes.
- The college has also entered into collaborations with other academic institutions through MoUs for conducting faculty and student exchange programmes.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Campus Infrastructure:

The College is equipped to offer quality teaching & learning in 34 courses (including B.Ed. Course).

The departments are distributed in 4 Buildings (inclusive of the Administrative Building).

There are 83 Classrooms, 20 science laboratories and 6 Computer laboratories equipped to conduct the experiments in the present curriculum offered by the University.

A good number of Computers with internet connection serve the necessity of the teaching learning activities in 6 departments.

The Conference Hall in the top floor of Administrative Building is mainly used to hold Academic Seminars, Lectures and Workshops, Teachers' Day, and other cultural events.

Playground: The College has a 3.2 acres playground at College-para. This playground is used for annual sports. Apart from this, another playground in the main campus with a Badminton Court and a Volley Ball Court flank at the western part of the administrative building.

Hostels (Girls' Hostel & Boys' Hostel) for distant students, separate common rooms for boys and girls, gymnasium etc. are other facilities provided.

The college has a medical centre Arogya with semi-trained 2 Nurses.

Distance learning study centres such as Netaji Subhas Open University for Distance Education is also housed within the campus.

Library Facility:

The College has a vibrant Library with 3 sections (Viz.- Central Library, Morning Library & B.Ed. Library) embracing the print and digital resources. Library automation process of the College is continuing using 'koha' Integrated Library Management Software. The bar-coded book circulation service is available. The library is quite large with over 50,000 books.

Open Educational Resource Repositories (OER repositories) including Sodhganga, e-sodhSindhu, ePGpathsala, Swayam, UGC-MOOCs, Internet Archive, NDLI etc can be accessed through Central Library webpage.

Research support for faculty members through journal article delivery service via e-mail is being provided.

Special Competitive exam guidance books are available in the College Library.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>Katwa College follows the curriculum developed by the University of Burdwan. In the year 2017, the University implemented the CBCS courses and in the year 2023, the university implemented NEP, 2020. In both the curriculums, there are ample scopes/ opportunities to use multi disciplinary/ interdisciplinary approaches. The College offers 17 subjects under the 3 streams viz. Arts, Science, Commerce and the College attempts to create a harmony among the streams to achieve a holistic approach, learning geared towards development and realisation of the complete personality of the learner is achieved. All the students have to compulsorily opt for environmental studies that provides an</p>
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opportunity for a multi disciplinary / inter disciplinary learning. The College offers flexibility to students to choose different subjects in different semesters. By encouraging students from all streams to participate in its various cultural programmes and contribute to the College magazine and wall magazines to enhance creativity. The NCC & NSS undertakes community work, environmental education and value education. The IQAC, Gender Audit & Gender Sensitization Committee, Go-Green committee, Nature Club, Seminar Committee, Convenors of Add-on courses organises various programmes throughout the year to promote awareness of the need of multi disciplinary approach in study amongst the students. The research cell encourages research for teachers & students. The journal committee publishes a multi disciplinary peer reviewed journal named “International Journal of Research on Social & Natural Science” in June & December, every year bearing ISSN: 2455-5916(Online) to encourage research skills amongst both teachers and students. Katwa College, Unit for publication helps the stakeholders for the publication of their papers through it.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The objective of Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry (APAAR) is one student ID. APAAR has been conceptualised under the National Education Policy (NEP, 2020) where all College/ University going students are supposed to register on ABC. According to the new rules, it is necessary to have an ABC id to take admission in any college/ University. Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a virtual/ digital storehouse that contains the information of the Credits acquired by the students throughout their academic session. It is founded on the model of the National Academic Depository (NAD) & NAD is the ABC’s backbone. Since ABC is initiated by the affiliating University, students register themselves to provide their data in the bank using the login id & password provided by the university. It promotes students mobility and academic freedom. Affiliating University uploaded all UG students’ credits in the University’s NAD account from where our students can obtain certificates, information by entering their University roll no. For preparedness related to NEP 2020, several initiatives have been taken into consideration.

Katwa College IQAC & ICT subcommittee jointly organized a workshop on “Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) based on Digilocker framework” on 30.05.2023 in the Auditorium Hall. Katwa College enlightened our students, teachers & NTS about importance & utility of ABC based on digilocker. The speakers trained the participants how to use ABC that benefited our students within a very short time. Secondly, several notices, videos, & guidelines have been circulated in the College website & notice boards. The ICT committee members and the DEOs helped the students for registering with the ABC. Now, all the students of Katwa College is under ABC, and as a result, National Level initiatives were duly initiated among the students as part of efforts for NEP 2020.

3. Skill development:

Katwa College is affiliated under The University of Burdwan and the College is bound to implement the curriculums of the affiliating university under CBCS and NEP, 2020. These courses significantly enhance the skills of the students and equip them properly. College has also taken some other initiatives for skill development in the form of capacity building programmes. The IQAC proposed to introduce an Add-on course by all the departments & the Governing Body of Katwa College, acknowledged the proposal and resolved that all departments shall arrange at least 1 or 2 Add-on courses mandatorily for all students of the College to give them exposure beyond the curriculum. Some of these courses encompassed life skills, while some of them are of soft skills category and remaining are of communicative skill types. The College also regularly arranged classes on values, observation of birthdays of several distinguished luminaries and arranged special classes for them in this regard. In addition to that, workshops, field training with the help of Kisan Mitra Cell and NSS units are arranged. Industrial trips, and study tours have been conducted by some departments to expose students beyond the classroom teaching as part completion of syllabus and make them implement the same in real life situation and environment. Libraries has been digitalised for 24 x 7 for online services providing an added advantage to them. Students can also access e-resources on INFLIBNET for better learning outcomes . MoU with Katwa Municipality enabled

the students of Commerce acquire practical knowledge in Municipal Works. This MoU also helps the NSS volunteers to have training in Solid Waste Management. Katwa College publishes a multi-disciplinary peer reviewed journal named “International Journal of Research on Social & Natural Science” in June & December, every year bearing ISSN: 2455-5916(Online) to encourage research skills among faculties & students. Many departments along with the Students Union publishes wall and e-magazines regularly. It is also noted that, all students have to compulsorily submit project work and among these project works, the best 5- 10 projects best chosen of the lot by the project supervisor are forwarded to the research publication peer team and from these the selected projects are published in the online journal. For skill enhancement in professional sectors, and promote entrepreneurship generation scope, college organises various programmes to provide students the best opportunities. Therefore soft skills training is provided for making them competent in professional spheres. The IQAC in collaboration with Gender sensitization & gender audit committee organised a programme on 14.03.2024 on “Self Help Groups-transforming lives, promoting & sustaining women empowerment”. The college also promotes interdisciplinary research activities for field development through organising seminars, workshops & hands-on training. Last but not least, the College signed MoUs with some social organisations like Society for Mental Healthcare, Ananda Niketan to promote value education among the students and encourage them to take part in social outreach activities of the College.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The primary objective of integrating Indian Knowledge System (IKS) into the education system is to ensure that Indian Ancient Knowledge like Ayurveda, Yoga & traditional Art be preserved & promoted for the future generation. Exposure of both modern & traditional idea can help pupils better understand their culture, ethos, broaden their intellectual horizons and boost their self assurance. This integration will help us achieve the main objective of NEP, 2020 to develop a holistic education that enables Bharat attain the title of Vishwaguru once again in the whole wide world. The

	<p>CBCS & NEP, 2020 curriculums of The University of Burdwan offers opportunities to acquire knowledge on Indian Education system. The syllabus of Bengali, History, Sanskrit, Philosophy & Political Science have units to impart Indian Education. Bengali provides the students an opportunity to learn Bengali literature, its history and culture. Sanskrit provides knowledge of Vedic traditions and preferences are also given to Devnagari script for learning Sanskrit. Philosophy integrates Indian thinkers, Indian values whereas History offers curriculum on Indian art and values. The students and teachers of Bengali department and the staff observe traditional Indian Language Day “Bhasha Divas” on 21st February every year. The Sanskrit department organised a seminar on “Dharmashastra” on 05.01.2024 & 06.01.2024. This topic helped the students to understand the values and ethics of Indian Education. Medical Plant garden “Charak” based on Indian Traditional system is prepared and maintained by the Department of Botany to preserve rare species of valuable trees and plants. College also offers various Add-on courses related to Indian heritage & Knowledge. Throughout the year, the college arranges many seminars, conferences, special lectures & cultural programmes to promote & exchange Indian Culture.</p>
<p>5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>Focusing on the outcome based education; Katwa College monitors continuous quality improvement for maintaining academic standards in all respects. For this purpose, before the introduction of CBCS and NEP, 2020 in the year 2017 & 2023 respectively, College authorities arranged for workshops offering training to teachers with the help of expert resource persons. In the year 2020, the college constituted a committee named NEP, 2020. This committee organises various programmes on POs & COs, Seminars & workshops. The committee also emphasises on teachers inclusion in NEP, 2020 orientation programmes organised by various Universities for acquiring proper information of NEP, 2020 as teachers are the pillars of student development and academic success. This implies that, the institute has organised for well trained & educated mentors, where the role of faculty is both as instructor, trainer or facilitator working to achieve best outcome. The institution prepares programme</p>

outcomes, programme specific outcomes & course outcomes for all the programmes offered by the college. It publishes all the POs & COs in the website before commencement of each semester. These are also communicated to the students as well. Issues in teaching & learning are taken care of by us that include continuous formative assessment and mapping of the curriculum and updating regularly to align with latest knowledge available & to meet specific learning outcomes, so that by the end of the educational session, each learner achieves the targeted goal. The departmental faculty members evaluate the learning outcomes through assessment of Internal Examinations and the results of examinations published by the University. The College evaluates learning outcomes based on the results of the students, progress of higher education, placement of the students and the feedback collected from them. On the basis of outcome, college can get an opportunity for self assessment and identify areas for further improvement. It is also noted that teaching learning process is criterion based rather than norm based as a result of which emphasis is also given on the achievement of cognitive affection and psychomotor based skills and not simply on numerical marks scored.

6. Distance education/online education:

The college runs a unit of NSOU which allows the students pursue their study in different UG & PG courses. During Covid-19 situation the college followed the guidelines of the IC, The University of Burdwan and appeal of the IQAC Katwa College for conducting online classes on Google platforms, whatsapp groups developed by the departments and hosted National & International events,e-seminars, YouTube channels & supplied e–contents for the study materials in the website. Our College is also listed in SWAYAM portal. A dedicated Studio room and 100 Mbps leased line with free wi-fi connection installed in the campus that enables global connectivity for the stakeholders of the college concerned. At present the college conducts academic and administrative activities through online mode as and when required.

Response:

Katwa College is affiliated to University of Burdwan and complies with its prescribed syllabus and curriculum. Faculties, who are the member of Board of Studies of the University of Burdwan, are invited in the beginning of the academic session to offer suggestions related to curriculum framework.

Effective Curriculum Planning and Delivery

- Before commencement of a new session, Academic calendar is meticulously prepared in accordance with the curriculum framed by the University of Burdwan, and get displayed in the college website. It provides tentative dates for the commencement of the academic sessions, tentative internal examinations, holidays in accordance with the Government of West Bengal Holiday List and University of Burdwan holiday list, institutional events like College Foundation Day, Annual Sports Day, and Annual Prize Day and so on. Vacations and session breaks are also mentioned.
- Katwa College offers 16 undergraduate courses including B.A, B.Sc. and B.Com programmes in Honours and 17 General following the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) designed by the University of Burdwan from academic session 2017-18 to 2022-23. Katwa college offers 4 and 3 years Major and 3 years minor courses following New Education Policy (NEP) designed by University of Burdwan from the academic session 2023-24.
- In the beginning of each academic session, a newly prepared prospectus is provided to each student admitted in the college.
- The Routine Committee prepares class schedules in the form of Master Routine prioritizing the needs of various departments in the beginning of academic session.
- Each department conducts departmental meeting at the beginning of the academic session and prepares tentative teaching plan. Faculty of each department chalks out the strategies of teaching and initiate preparation of the lesson plans in consonance with the course structure after due consultation with the Heads of the Department.
- Based on the tentative teaching plan, each department prepares departmental routine, following the master routine. The departmental routine is distributed among the departmental students and also uploaded in the departmental website.

Mechanism of Effective Curriculum Delivery

- The college provides feedback regarding the curriculum to the University of Burdwan.
- The faculties prepare e-materials, maintain class records, and make strategies to complete the syllabus within the stipulated time.

- Each department takes class test to continuously evaluate the students and conducts Parent-Teacher meeting to keep their parents updated regarding class attendance etc.
- Project work, excursions and field surveys are organized by the departments as per the syllabus for comprehensive delivery of the curriculum. Students learn easily through these empirical techniques.
- The college offers extreme library support to the students

Continuous Internal Evaluation Assessment

For the purpose of conducting Continuous Internal Evaluation, teachers prepare class tests and assignments in accordance with their allotted time table keeping the academic calendar and planned co-curricular activities of the college in mind. PROFESSIONAL ETHICS:

Professional ethics has been a part of the curriculum of Commerce and Economics which includes ethical issues in its relevant fields. The IQAC has taken special initiatives to organize seminars and lectures on intellectual property rights to sensitize teachers and students. The IQAC has organized seminars to create awareness on 'plagiarism' and disseminate information on what is plagiarism, how to avoid it and what are the tools for checking plagiarism.

GENDER EQUALITY:

Gender inclusive core courses have been included as a part of curriculum of English, History, Bengali, Political Science and Geography. These courses shed light on women's education and inequality and women empowerment. It focuses on their role in literature and social reforms. In order to make them aware of gender rights, gender-based violence, emphasis on gender and work, gender and politics etc., the college has taken different initiatives.

HUMAN VALUES:

Human values have been included in undergraduate courses of Philosophy, Sanskrit, Political Science, Bengali and English as a part of ethics, peace education and value education. Students of Katwa College actively participate in NSS outreach programmes to promote human values of social integration and harmony. The IQAC and some departments have also arranged seminars and special classes along with some add-on courses to inculcate the values of sharing and helping. In addition to that, the college has also arranged various programmes to celebrate the commemorative days to spreading the values among the stake holders.

ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY:

The issue of Environment and its Sustainability is one of the prime emphasising areas of the courses existing in Botany, Zoology, Geography and Chemistry. In addition to that, the Environmental Science/ Education course is compulsory for every first-year undergraduate student of any stream. This course emphasis on the global environment and its sustainability to grow an all-inclusive understanding among the students and help them to become socially responsible and environmentally conscious human beings. The college has adopted the use of alternating energy sources using solar panels. For the conservation of natural water, the college has a rain water harvesting unit. The college has a dedicated vermicompost plant within the college premises. Katwa College has taken a special initiative to undertake mangrove plantation along the banks of the Ganges in Lahiripur. The NSS and NCC in collaboration with IQAC have organized various programs on cleanliness and tree plantations in local areas and to make single-use plastic-free zone to reduce the environmental pollution.

- Katwa college is affiliated under the University of Burdwan and the assessment and evaluation process guided by the rules framed by the University.
 - University implemented Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) starting from 2017-18 and implemented NEP (New Education Policy) from 2020.
 - In theoretical courses across all programmes, 20% (13.3 internal and 6.6 for attendance) allocated based on internal examination (IE) while the remaining 80% is determined by external examiners in the end semester examination (ESE).
 - For practical based courses, attendance (6.66%), and internal assessment (13.33%), 26.66% marks for practical examination and the remaining marks for ESE.
 - Continuous Internal Evaluation conducted by the departments in the form of class test, assignment, student seminars, project works, quiz competition and viva voce examinations.
 - Final dates of the internal examinations are announced and displayed centrally in the notice board by the examination sub-committee.

- Orientation programme: Students informed about the mechanism of internal/external assessment system (also mentioned in the Academic Calendar)
 - Impartial, unbiased and transparent internal assessment system

- The internal assessment is conducted both in the physical and online mode.
- The exam committee arranges all the exam related details including publishing exam schedule, assigning seats, collecting question papers from various department etc.
- Internal examination answer scripts assessed by the respective subject teacher and marks uploaded by the concerned subject teacher on the marks capture portal of BU.
- Re-examination in case of medical grounds with appropriate documents.

Strategies adopted to ensure attainment of POs and COs are evaluated through several direct and indirect assessment tools.

Direct Methods: Involves the performance of students in both Continuous Internal Assessment throughout the year and End-of-Semester Examination.

i) Continuous Internal Assessment: In adherence to the regulations of affiliating University, college conducts internal evaluation of 15 marks consisting of attendance of 5 marks and Continuous Evaluation of 10 marks. In addition, Katwa College also conducts continuous internal evaluation through class tests, discussions, project-based assignments, which helps to gauge the course outcomes and provides opportunities to students for improvement. Practical examinations and viva-voce/group discussion in several curricula enables evaluation of the learning outcomes more objectively.

ii) Semester Examination Performance Analysis: Grades obtained through informative and summative evaluations are the direct measures of attainment of Specific Course Objectives (COs). Marks as obtained by students at every semester end and at the end of the entire course is a way to exemplify the pattern of achievement that the course had to offer. The students who receive highest marks in the University examination are awarded, so that it boosts their morale and motivates others to perform well.

Indirect Methods:

i) Robust Feedback mechanism: The College practices robust feedback mechanism for the maintenance of the existing standard as well as upgradation of the overall teaching learning ambience. Feedback from students, teachers, alumni and employer is taken in every academic year for this purpose. The IQAC evaluates student's feedback on teacher's performance regarding concept delivery, timely completion of curriculum assigned, evaluation etc. The students' feedback is taken separately on syllabi, and the overall institutional provisions assigned. Feedbacks are analyzed by the IQAC, reported to the college authority for elucidation and resolutions. A report on these feedbacks is even featured on the college website.

ii) Student's progression: An important parameter of measurement of outcome of the programme is the progression of the students to higher levels of education in various institutions of the state and the country. Students passing out from the college after completion of the UG programmes pursue their Post graduate degrees in various premier institutes of the nations. Moreover, many students qualify for JAM, GATE, NET, SET and other competitive examinations as conducted by the Central or State Agencies. Katwa College through its various departments including NSS and NCC organises a range of extension activities. NSS celebrates Independence Day, Republic Day, Netaji Jayanti, NSS Foundation Day and College Foundation Day annually. The NCC battalion of Katwa College also celebrates Independence Day, Republic Day and hoists the National Flag on these occasions. The NCC celebrates Netaji Jayanti every year to create awareness among students about the contribution of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose in the freedom struggle. Kargil Vijay Divas is celebrated every year to showcase the indomitable spirit of Indian valour. It also observes World Water Day and World Environment Day to create awareness about environmental crisis. It has also organized programmes on Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and World No Tobacco Day to create awareness regarding cleanliness and ill-effects of tobacco consumption respectively and on International Yoga Day to highlight the importance of Yoga in daily life.

The institutional leadership encourages the NSS and NCC units and provides every kind of support for organizing these programmes and activities.

The college has also organized a mangrove sapling plantation programme at Sunderbans as an initiative of the Geography Department. It has organized a Science Exhibition with participation of students of nearby schools as part of Institutional Social Responsibility. It has also organized visits of senior school students to science departments and labs to encourage them to pursue higher studies in science.

The first award in this category is the college securing first position in Best College Category in Purba Barddhaman district in Kanyashree Prakalpa by the Government of West Bengal in 2019-20. A student has also secured Third position in Paschimbanga Rajya Chhatra Yuva Utsav in the same year. In 2024 the college has secured Serar Sera Puja Award for Saraswati Puja. The college has received certificates of appreciation for holding AIDS awareness camps from Agradwip Gram Panchayat, tree plantation programme in adopted villages, protection of girl child from early marriage and Women's Education Campaign from Karajgram Gram Panchayat, prevention and awareness initiatives during Covid-19 and campaign on Safe Drive Save Life from Katwa Municipality, and various initiatives like electoral literacy, tree plantation and conservation campaigns, initiatives for plastic free environment, advocacy against tobacco use, prevention of AIDS and Dengue etc from Agradwip Gram Panchayat. Two students have secured First position at the Nadi Utsav organized by Dwijendralal College. Many of our girl students have secured prizes in both sports and cultural categories. Our girl students have secured First position in National Womens Sports Championship 2023, First position in Harihar Bankapasi Sammilani Dance Competition in 2021-22, Second position in International Karate and Kobudo Championship Award 2021, second position in JKA India National Karate Championship, 2023 and the first position in JKA India West Bengal State Karate Championship 2023.

Through the Annual Sports Meet event and various Cultural competitions and events, the college encourages students to participate in extra-curricular activities and develop their talents. The teachers who are in charge of the Sports and Cultural Sub-Committees take initiatives to involve the students in these activities. The students union organizes Saraswati Puja every year where talents of students in decoration, creative arts etc are showcased. - A fully automated Library equipped with cloud based koha-ILMS contains about 50 thousand books including a collection of rare and old books. It offers thousands of e-books, Journals, Theses, Dissertations and many more. Moreover, additional services like OPAC Service, Career Guidance, Digital Library Services and Research Support Services etc. and also executes several extension activities throughout the year.
- **17 ICT classrooms** are well distributed in different academic blocks.
- The faculty and the students can harness varied academic information from the Learning Management System(LMS).
- A large playground, Badminton Court, Volley Ball Court and a gymnasium for the students with updated equipments.
- A room for Students' Union, 02 separate Common Rooms, and toilets both for the Girls and Boys are also to mention.
- Ramps at different locations to facilitate the Divyangjan students are found.
- Rain water harvesting unit, Ground water recharging unit and Solar panels have been installed.
- Air-Quality Monitoring system has been installed by the West Bengal Pollution Control Board.
- Medicinal plants garden maintained by the Department of Botany and Animal Museum housed at Department of Zoology.
- Waste bins in front of Academic Building, Administrative Building, Bio-science Building, B.Ed. Building and College Canteen have facilitated the solid waste management. The chemical wastes however are disposed of via duct outside the college premises to the high drain.
- Cycle Stand with security Guard facilitates the students in keeping their bicycles.
- The college has a Canteen which is a source of refreshment to the stakeholders in between long working hours.
- 2 Kirloskar Generators, each of 35 kVA capacity used as power back-up devices.
- Whole college campus is under CCTV surveillance for 24 x 7.
- College provides indoor game facilities viz: Table tennis, Cream Board, Chessboard etc.

- The Pandemic situation has led us to get habituated with an IT-assisted teaching-learning evaluation process. The Google Classrooms, online examination systems via Google forms, Worksheets have helped a lot in curbing health risks.
- The College aims to provide IT as a learning aid to the students as well as the faculty members with various study and research materials. All the departments and the library of the college are equipped with ample numbers of Desktops, Laptops, Scanners, LCD Projectors, Laser Printers. Reprographic facilities are made available for utilizing the library for study and research.
- BSNL wireless internet facility (Wi-Fi) is accessible at different corners of the college and has been updated to optical fibre (FTTH) network with an average bandwidth of 150Mbps from 100 Mbps. Easy access to the internet from every Department gives better opportunity in the teaching learning process.
- 17ICT based class rooms are at work with technical facilities.
- A Studio Room for recording important lecture.
- Close Circuit Cameras with HD DVR got installed in the Central Library and in the Office of the Principal.
- Audio-visual Classroom set up has been structured in the Central Library.
- The Office of the Principal is also using the updated facilities of technology to carry out the administrative works. Apart from this, it also envisions a paperless administration, likewise the notices, general guidelines, circulars are disseminated to all departments through wireless medium.
- To support these IT network systems, all the computers and the requisites are connected to uninterrupted power supply and high-performance computing servers. All computers are monitored through the AMC and are regularly updated as and when suggested by the attending personnel.
- This college has a clearly stated policy regarding IT upgradation with special emphasis on updating curriculum-based software at regular intervals and regarding prevention of IT malpractices as well through Cyber Security Pledge. It is noteworthy here that during the last academic session, the institute organized a one-day seminar as a part of Student's Observance Week, whereby students were taught measures to handle the different academic and scholarship portals with utmost care and safety.
- The college acquires fund from the students' admission and submit a part of it to the Treasury, West Bengal through TR Form No.- 7. The remaining part of this fund is utilised in an optional manner for the utmost benefits of the students and deferent stakeholders. The college also accumulates fund for conducting public examination, CSC examination, MLA, MP, LAD and from alumni. In this way the college tries to ensure maximum utilisation of available funds. It strives to maintain a liberal budget towards up gradation and maintenance of IT infrastructure.

The governing body spearheads the governance followed by the Principal (who is also the Secretary of the GB). 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

- The Bursar along with the Finance Committee prepares budget in the form of proposals involving different components like Infrastructure Development, Academic upliftment and others and submits it to the Governing Body/Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal (where it is applicable). On reception of permission/grants, the college mobilizes funds as per strategic planning on the basis of the proposals. The college authority disburses the funds optimally to provide benefit to all teaching, non-teaching and contractual staff.
- The external audit takes place under an External Auditor recommended by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal. The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure are checked. Departmental Accession Register, Dead Stock Registers/Purchase Registers are physically checked. The Utilisation Grant Certificates are also audited by the external auditor. Enquiry of any kind during the audit is promptly addressed by presenting relevant documents to the auditors.
- For the grants received from the Higher Education Department and non-government sources, utilization certificates are prepared according to the allowed expenditure under various heads. Annually the Accountant prepares the financial data. This is again verified and scrutinized by the Bursar and the Principal for authenticity, transparency and financial accuracy. For Internal Audit, the college appoints a qualified Chartered Accountant with approval from the Governing Body.
- It also acquires Non-Government Fund from students' admission and submits a part of it to Treasury, Govt. of WB through TR-7 Form. The residual part of this fund is utilized in an optimal manner for the benefit of the students and different stakeholders.
- The college with the help of Finance Sub-committee is dedicated for effective utilization of funds

with utmost transparency and integrity.

- Funds acquired from alumni and other sources (MLA, MP LAD) as well as by conducting public examinations.
- It adopts a liberal budget for maintenance and improvement of IT infrastructure.
- College conducts internal as well as external audits properly at justified intervals of time. External Audit is conducted by the Auditor selected by the DPI office, Govt. of West Bengal.
- College has a well organized Purchase Committee and the college follows tender process as per Government regulations for purchasing item/instrument.
- Payment to the suppliers is made after deducting tax as per Income Tax Rules.
- College is running under three shifts. The building, laboratory and library are used on optimal basis.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

In **2019-20** the best practices highlighted were of faculty members actively engaged in high quality research and in transferring the results of the research to students and community through their publication, lectures, presentations etc. Some teachers are active in publishing papers in journals and other scholarly publications both at National and International levels. There is a statutory provision of study leave for faculty members for research activities. The college encourages the teachers to apply for Major/ Minor Research Projects. Space and necessary infrastructural support are provided for research work. The college has taken initiative to publish International Peer Reviewed Bi-Annual Journal titled “International Journal of Research on Social and Natural Sciences” .Some Faculty members are engaged as research guides.

Student-centered learning was also marked broadly encompassing methods of teaching that shift the focus of instruction from the teacher to the student. It aims to develop learner autonomy and independence by putting responsibility for the learning path in the hands of students by imparting them with skills and basis on how to learn a specific subject and schemata required to measure up to the specific performance requirement.A compulsory teacher training course for new junior teachers, encouraged student entered learning. A program-level quality enhancement initiative utilized a student survey to identify strengths and potential areas for improvement. The introduction of program reviews served as a quality assurance measure.

In **2020-21** one of the best practices marked was the establishment of a medicinal plant garden named Charak Udyan of 60’×30’ area with medicinal and aromatic plants, many of which are highly valuable, for both preservative and educational purposes. The garden was to act as a germplasm stock for the local people for conserving the valuable medicinal and aromatic plants. Another objective was to make people conscious about the importance of these medicinal and aromatic plants in the context of national as well as global market. Plants like Antamul (Anti-asthmatic properties), Nayantara (Anticancer Ant diabetic) and Zamia (cerebral insufficiency and for improving mental performance) were preserved.

Providing holistic education was another conspicuous step. The objectives were to inculcate empathy and team work among students and entrepreneurial expertise along with excellence in academic curriculum to help them in their future endeavours.

In **2021-22**, advanced students taking classes of junior semesters under guidance of departmental teachers was highlighted. The objective of the practice is to motivate students to prepare a topic well enough to take a class on it and also builds up their confidence, ability to express themselves on a subject matter and handle a class situation. It is also meant to encourage peer learning.

A medical unit was set up to help both the stakeholders of Katwa College as well as the neighbouring residents in case of any first aid requirement or emergency oxygen requirement in the context of the Covid-19 epidemic when shortage of required oxygen was reported.

In **2022-23**, Taking classes by senior students for junior semesters and Value education classes by internal and external resource person continued in a more enveloping form since the activity resulted in widespread qualitative success in terms of boosting the personality development of students. The importance of value education in the context of developing into responsible citizens was observed and therefore the measure.

While the practice of an active Medical Unit continued, it was given an extra edge through the nomenclature of “Arogya”. It was inaugurated on 29.03.2022 by the SDO, Katwa and President, Katwa College, Governing Body. Apart from the basic weighing scales, sphygmomanometer, instrument for removing sutures, saline arrangements, oxygen cylinders, were arranged for in the unit. A medical practitioner, one of the GB members is actively involved in the Unit for health check up free of cost.

In **2023-24**, an innovative handicrafts exhibition titled “Udhbhaboni” was thought upon. The programme organised jointly by the Cultural cell and NSS units of the college and funded by the Governing Body had the objectives of encouraging the interested undergraduate students to learn and practice the art of handicrafts making with a view to opening up a channel for self-employment and to bring them under the spotlight of public and social media to open opportunities for earning. The items sold at these stalls were of good quality and comparatively less price. There were also cultural programmes by artistes from the college. Many decorative items and ornaments of clay, wood etc were popular attractions. Various food items especially sweets, cakes and “*pithe*” were major attractions. This exhibition gave an opportunity to local artisans to sell their products and reach a larger consumer base and give a fillip to their business. The 23 stalls together sold goods worth about Rs. 40,000 in two days. The volunteers of the NSS also sold eco-friendly pens, containing seeds of various trees, so that when the pen is thrown away after use, the seeds may germinate and sprout. Eco-friendly jute items were also sold.

Community awareness through Kishan Mitra Cell was another such earmarked practice to promote sustainable livelihoods for medium, small and marginal farmers by improving the knowledge of intensive farming. The selected villages were visited and soil samples were collected by the students at 2 feet depth by sample collection instrument with the help of Cadastral Map and GPS location. The sample was processed to test to determine the NPK status, pH level, Organic Carbon. The present condition of lands through the Banglar Bhumi website was cross checked. Farmers were more interested in the use of Plantix apps, where they get the chance to measure plant health as well as determine the plant health issues and related solutions. Farmers have acquired more confidence to mitigate economic and ecological risks.

The best practices in the last five sessions range from core academic issues from transferring knowledge of research interests to co-curricular applications like maintaining of medicinal plants, medical unit for local and institutional benefits to student seminars for peer learning and the institution acting as a springboard for providing an impetus towards self-employment to make students empowered. This has

been an effort to be in tune for valuable contributions towards economic and social development.

Special Morning Shift in Katwa College

Objectives of the Practice:

The College operates on multi-shifts with a special morning shift from 1970 only for females or girls among each stratum of the surrounding rural villages. The objective is to empower them by providing equal access to education, knowledge, skills, and opportunities. The primary goals are to “ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities through holistic, transformative, and gender-sensitive approaches.

Easy access to education and supportive policies: Teaching learning starts at 7am in the early morning and ends in 1.00 pm. Hence girls are able to continue their higher education side by side and complete their daily work. Katwa College also offers a special and separate girls’ hostel Maitreyee. Admission to a course is completely merit-based; college authorities try to provide educational access to almost all women applicants through General courses. Seven important subjects - Bengali, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Environmental Science and Philosophy are offered.

Develop Skill and extracurricular activities through Add on Training:-

Katwa College also offers skill development programs and arranges quarterly courses specifically on Communicative English, Beautician Course, Basic Computer Training, Yoga and self-defense Karate programs, Dance, Drama and Song etc. along with regular classes.

Opportunities for all across caste and religion: Government Rules reserve seats for SC, ST, OBC, Minority and seats under sports category and encourage them to value quality education side by side along with general students.

Safe & Supportive Environment: College is under CCTV surveillance. 24 hour security is provided

and there is a Grievance cell in our college where students can report any safety concerns, incidents, or harassment anonymously and appropriate action is taken in response to reports. It is noticeable that among the total teaching faculties near about 50% teacher are female along with a female librarian and hostel super only for morning shift.

Health Awareness: Various departments provide courses and workshops on health education, hygiene, nutrition and reproductive health. Arogya is a special health care unit controlled by women attendants.

Active participation in NSS: Our College promotes the involvement of female students in the National Service Scheme (NSS). This participation offers opportunities for community engagement, skill enhancement, and social impact.

Sensitization Programmes : Gender sensitization committee observes Women’s Day etc and promotes awareness of gender as a social construct through workshops seminars and hands on essay, quiz and poster competitions.

To address these issues, college authorities work with local communities to challenge and change social norms that impede women's education. Awareness campaigns and community outreach programs help to inform families about the benefits of educating women. In addition to offering various scholarships, some committed faculty members provide information and guidance on financial planning, part-time job opportunities, and student loan options to help women manage their financial limitations. By implementing these strategies and initiatives, our college fosters an inclusive educational environment for women.

Lastly, majority of students enrolled and participating in curricular and co-curricular activities are female and this reflection is a positive manifestation and a quality indicator to envision female empowerment in all its aspects.
